


# Oregon Child Integrated Dataset

OCID is an objective, nonpartisan data project to support Oregon’s policymakers and community leaders as they work to improve outcomes for the state’s children and families.

Created in 2019, OCID integrates data from across state agencies to provide a powerful cross-program, longitudinal view of the well-being of children in Oregon. This information is linked with birth records to show the trajectory of children’s well-being from birth and throughout their development.

## What can Oregonians expect from OCID in 2020-2021?

- A publicly available Child Well-being Dashboard that allows users to filter data on health, education, child welfare, juvenile justice, and other key indicators by demographic and program information to reveal disparities, interactions, or trends.
- In-depth analyses using advanced statistical and modeling techniques. Initial analyses, with an anticipated release in the first quarter of 2021, will help policymakers and community leaders target resources more effectively and efficiently, to focus efforts on the greatest needs of Oregon’s children.

## OCID Strengths

- Objective and nonpartisan
- Longitudinal and cross-program; includes all children born in Oregon since 2001 and their known parents
- Unique to Oregon

## OCID Limitations

- Does not show the full diversity in Oregon; currently only Oregon-born children are included.
- Cannot be used as a standalone source for state agency data, but rather as a companion.

## OCID Governance

The OCID Governance Committee's mission is to guide the development of a credible and sustainable data resource that minimizes bias in data, is equitable in access and application, and enables a focused impact for Oregon.

Governance Committee members include Oregon legislators; directors of state agencies contributing data to OCID; Chief Data Officer; and representatives from the Governor's Children's Cabinet, the Legislative Fiscal Office, and philanthropic organizations.
